<u>Bishop James Conley and Father Gary Coulter will lead a retreat</u>
<u>December 14-16</u> at Good Counsel Retreat House for men and women of all ages, entitled, "The Mysteries of Christmas."

Several of the Joyful Mysteries of the rosary are typically associated with Christmas, such as the Annunciation, Nativity, and Presentation in the Temple, but what not everyone knows is that Epiphany is traditionally associated not only with the wise men but also two other mysteries: the Baptism of Jesus and the Miracle at the Wedding in Cana, which are also 'Epiphanies' that make Jesus known.

Fr. Coulter points out, "Although Mary plays a key role in the Christmas story, and occupies a central focus in the Rosary, she always leads us to know and love her son, Jesus. As Mary's lasts recorded words in the gospels say, 'Do whatever he tells you.' "

As both great books for Advent reading and as source for the retreat, Bishop Conley recommends Jesus of Nazareth: the Infancy Narratives by Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI. Fr. Coulter recommends Joy to the World: How Christ's Coming Changed Everything (and Still Does) by Dr. Scott Hahn.

The retreats begin 8 p.m. Friday with a Rosary and Mass, and end at noon Sunday with Mass and lunch, for a suggested donation of \$170. *Note: Bishop Conley will present 3 talks, Father Coulter, 4 talks.*

PASTOR'S NOTES:

Maranatha—Come, Lord Jesus! This is the prayer of Advent. We know that God is with us. and yet we long for His coming. He came to us in history (in Bethlehem); He comes to us in mystery (in the sacraments); He will come in majesty (on the Last Day). We easily remember the First Coming told in the Annunciation and Christmas stories, but we can forget the wonder of God's coming to us in the sacraments now and the aweinspiring knowledge that He will come again in glory. Advent is all of these things. Like St. John the Baptist, we are anxious for Him to come. Like the Blessed Virgin Mary, we learn to await Him in patience and hope. Certainly we should enjoy the many good things of the secular "holiday season," but do not pitch out your celebration with the trash on Christmas Day afternoon. Christmas Eve and Christmas Day are the beginning of the real "Christmas season," not the end.

Thanks to Fr. Jirovsky and all who attended any part of the Forty Hours adoration—special thanks to our loyal and faithful perpetual adorers, who are always ready to serve the Lord. Thanks also to all who took part in the Eucharistic procession and rally in Lincoln at the State Capitol a few weeks ago. God bless!

A belated note—we had only about 40 children at the door on Halloween, not to mention the adults, but the leftover candy is being used by St. Nicholas (the "real" Santa!) to help the boys and girls prepare for the coming of the Lord at Christmas. St. Nicholas has his feast on December 6. He was the bishop of Myra in what is now Turkey (then, it was part of the Roman Empire, and this was the time—the fourth century-that Christianity became legal and even became the state religion). He was said to have been one of the bishops at the first ecumenical council, at Nicaea, which affirmed our belief that Jesus is indeed divine as well as human, and it is said that he pulled the beard of Arius, the priest who created the heresy that was the reason for the council. Arius (incorrectly) taught that Jesus was the

greatest of God's creatures, but a creature nevertheless. We, however, believe as orthodox Christians (as in the Nicene Creed) that He is: "God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through Him all things were made." The boys and girls in the Netherlands put out shoes or stockings with a coin or two on the eve of St. Nicholas, and Nicholas takes these things and uses them for the poor children who have nothing. This great saint of charity and children teaches us to prepare for the coming of the Christ Child by such acts of kindness, with a spirit of giving in thankful response to the ultimate Gift that we received in the manger. If the boys and girls are bad, they receive a lump of coal, a rock, a stick, or (in Nebraska) a corn cob with no corn on it—and field corn, to boot! If they are good, they may receive apples, oranges, nuts, or candy. Many have this custom, or something similar, in their homes on Christmas Eve. Prepare the way of the Lord!

This week we also celebrate St. Lucy (on Thursday). She was an early Christian martyr. Her name means "light" and her feast comes close to the day of least daylight in the whole year. One legend says that she had her eyes removed as part of her martyrdom. In Sweden, the oldest daughter brings breakfast to the other family members, wearing a crown of lit candles (sounds rather dangerous!). She, of course, witnessed to the real Light of the world (as did St. John the Baptist). Another great Advent saint—Come, Lord Jesus!

The United States joins Mexico and all the other nations of the Americas in honoring Our Lady of Guadalupe on Wednesday. Mary appeared to St. Juan Diego as the pregnant Mother of God and precipitated the heartfelt conversion of millions to Jesus Christ. The New Eve paves the way for the New Adam, Who will redeem us on the Cross!
