PASTOR'S NOTES:

The Pope's intention for the month of January: Young People and the Example of Mary. That young people, especially in Latin America, follow the example of Mary and respond to the call of the Lord to communicate the joy of the Gospel to the world. The Priest Intention: Pray for the Holy Father. Thank you for your continuing prayers for these intentions and for each other. God bless!

Today is the Feast of the Holy Family, a fitting time to celebrate Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, and to remember that this family was about as perfect as it gets. When we compare our own family situations with theirs, we may get discouraged and disheartened, but it should simply remind us of how good God has been to us, and if we are thoroughly enjoying the company of all of the family gathered together during this time of year, all the more so. Each person should remember that he or she is not alone—that we all belong to some branch of the human family, but we are all part of the same family tree. No man is an island, and each one of us is bound by ties to many others, whether of blood and kinship or affection and friendship. And, most of all, we belong to the Father, Who has chosen us as His own by adoption.

Tuesday, New Year's Day, is the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. It is a holy day of obligation in the United States, and there will be two Masses here for people to attend-Monday evening (New Year's Eve) at 5 P.M., and Tuesday morning (New Year's Day) at 9 A.M. Mary's oldest feast is a fitting way to begin 2019. Mary's title, given to her by the faithful long before the ecumenical Council of Ephesus enshrined it in Church teaching in 431-that if Jesus is one Person, both true Man and true God (the "hypostatic union"), and Mary is His mother (as Man), then she is the mother of the Person Who is Divine-she, a creature, is truly the Mother of God. The Council wanted to clarify and teach that Jesus is a Divine Person (the Second Person of the Holy Trinity), Who has both a divine nature and a human nature. Mary is not just the Christotokos, the Christbearer, but truly the Theotokos-the God-bearer. This feast reaffirms the Incarnation (the Word became Flesh and made His dwelling among us) and the human ties that bind Jesus to Mary and therefore to all of us as well.

This week's featured Seminarian: Matthew Kovar from David City, who entered seminary in 2014 and is now is in Theology 2 at Mount St. Mary. We pray, too, for <u>Adam Bohan</u> from Plattsmouth, who entered seminary for the Society of Jesus in 2015. Please keep all our seminarians and sisters in formation in your prayers.

Mary was not just the physical "vessel" in which the Savior came, but even more importantly, she was the first and greatest disciple that He had (cf. Mt.12:46-50, Mk. 3:31-35, Lk. 8:19-21, and also Lk. 11:27-28, but also Lk. 1:28, 42, and 48). "Round yon virgin, mother and Child; holy Infant so tender and mild"—so we sing of this truth in the beloved carol "Silent Night." God is here!

Monday morning we celebrate St. Sylvester, the first Pope after the Church emerged from the catacombs; Wednesday is Saints Basil and Gregory Nazianzen, two of the three Cappadocian Fathers (the third is St. Gregory of Nyssa, a brother to Basil); Thursday is the Most Holy Name of Jesus (which He received at His circumcision on the eighth day, see Lk. 2:21 and also Lk. 1:31 and Mt. 1:21); Friday is St. Elizabeth Ann Seton; and Saturday is St. John Neumann. These last two are American saints-Mother Seton was the first American-born canonized saint, although she was a British subject when she was born in 1774 in New York City, and Bishop Neumann was born in what is now the Czech Republic, but worked as a missionary on the American frontier before becoming the Bishop of Philadelphia. Both of these saints were instrumental in helping to set up the wonderful Catholic school system that has been a great blessing to our Enjoy a blessed Church and to our nation. Christmastide!

No school this week. Friday is the First Friday of January and the priests will be visiting the homebound with the sacraments. The First Friday of the month holds special place for those devoted to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, as taught by St. Margaret Mary and others. Friday is always a day to remember the Passion and Death of our Savior—He died for us, and that was the reason He came into the world in the first place. Thank you, Lord!

I want to take this opportunity to thank the faithful acolytes who have been (and continue) bringing Holy Communion to some of the shut-ins on Fridays (except First Friday, when the priests do so) and those who have, in the last few months, been bringing Holy Communion on the Lord's Day, on Sundays, to most of them. May God bless your generous hearts!
