PASTOR'S NOTES:

This coming Thursday is the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, a holy day of obligation in the United States, and a celebration highly appropriate for a people that is an Easter people with "alleluia" as our song (cf. St. Augustine). Mary, the first and greatest of the Lord's disciples, teaches us and exemplifies for us what we can expect—to have body and soul joined together again (although separated at the time of death) for all eternity—the "resurrection of the body." She is the sign of the harvest that will be gathered in in eternity, the harvest of which Jesus Himself is the "first fruits," as revealed in His resurrection on Easter Sunday. Whether Mary (in union with her Son, Who died) "died" or (since she was not subject to death because she was not subject, by God's grace, to the effects of original sin) simply "fell asleep" (the "dormition") is a subject of study for theologians, but it does not change the importance of this feast. There will be three Masses to help you fulfill your obligation to give worship (an obligation shared by all creatures, and not only human beings, although we humans are privileged to share that worship with our brother, Jesus Christ, Who offers the perfect prayer and sacrifice—that of Good Friday—to the Father): at 6 P.M. Wednesday evening, at 8 A.M. Thursday morning, and at 7 P.M. Thursday evening. I have noticed here, but also elsewhere, that about one-half of the people that we have "on the books" are here on a given weekend, but only about one-fourth (half of the one-half) are here on the typical holy day. In talking to other priests and people in other parishes around the country, this seems to be the norm. Some of this, no doubt, is due to work conditions and so forth, but it is something to ponder, at any rate. Holy days are a reminder that eternity breaks in even on "regular days" during the week besides Sunday, the Lord's own day.

Speaking of being absent, yours truly will be attending our annual family reunion in North Carolina next weekend. After Mom (in 2014) and Dad (in 2012) died, the six siblings that they brought into the world have tried to meet annually, around the time of their anniversary

(August 18, married at the Our Lady of Nebraska Chapel of St. Cecilia's Cathedral in Omaha in 1951). Each sibling gets to pick the venue. My brother (#4 in the lineup—I being #1), who moved recently to North Carolina with his wife from New Jersey, chose the state of his residency as this year's venue. My plan is to fly out Friday morning and to return on Monday. The only requirement is to pick the place for one family meal—there are other gatherings associated with it, of course, but that is the core of the gettogether. I was also there in 2017, when #2, the oldest of the sisters, also chose that same state of her residence as the venue. Besides the two who live in North Carolina, the other four of us live in mother Nebraska. Please pray for safe travel. Fr. Gross will take good care of you.

I also want to call to your attention SpiritFest 2019, which will be held next Saturday night here on the grounds of the Church of the Holy Spirit, thanks to our great musicians, beginning with the patriarch of them all, Terry Little. He is quick to point out that this year is the 50th anniversary of a gathering called Woodstock, which one or two of you might be old enough to remember. This promises to be much tamer and family-oriented than that ancient gathering, and you are welcome to attend.

Believe it or not, a week from Wednesday (namely, August 21) is the first day of the new school year, at least at St. John the Baptist Catholic School. The price we pay for getting out in May is that we start in the middle of August. Incidentally, the reason most schools are doing this is twofold: 1. By starting this early, the Christmas/New Year break falls in the middle of the school year—we can finish the first semester before vacation, and 2. Sports practices begin in August—this date is set by the state, and since busses are running in many schools for sports, it makes sense to bring everybody else in at the same time. As long as the airconditioning works, I guess it is all right. Enjoy the rest of summer—the "dog days," as they are called.
