### **PASTOR'S NOTES:**

Today we celebrate the Second Sunday of Advent, but it is also the traditional day of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which gets "bumped" to Monday. Although it is the national patronal feast of the United States of America, when it moves to Monday like this year, there is no Mass obligation. You are still invited to join us on Monday morning at 8:10 with the school children for that celebration.

This weekend we celebrate Forty Hours, a traditional Eucharistic devotion that remembers the forty hours or so between the time of the crucifixion of the Lord and His resurrection. It was popularized in the sixteenth century by St. Phillip Neri and St. Charles Borromeo, among others. That tradition only regards the time that is used, for the Lord was hidden from the eyes of His followers on earth during that time, but in this devotion, He is revealed to us as He was to them at His resurrection. We see Him, in the Flesh (although it has the appearance of bread), just as He revealed Himself when He came to earth (the Incarnation). We behold, not just a symbol of Jesus, but Jesus Himself, as He said at the end of St. Matthew's Gospel: "And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Mt. 28:20b). He also promised at the Last Supper: "I will not leave you orphans; I will come to you" (Jn. 14:18). The Eucharist is the fulfillment of that promise to us—He comes as heavenly Food for body and soul. Forty Hours is a chance for us to have a meditation on the Redemption (Holy Week and Easter) and the Incarnation (Christmas and Epiphany). No matter how early it gets dark, no matter how bad things sometimes seem, Jesus is here for His people. Thanks to Fr. McGuire for leading us this weekend. When I came to Plattsmouth, I found that this was already a truly "Eucharistic" parish, being the smallest parish in the diocese to have true Perpetual Adoration (twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, fifty-two weeks of the year), but it is still good to renew our love for the Lord Who gives Himself for us. Just as the exposition on Friday evening opened the weekend, we will conclude with a short procession (much like the one on Holy Thursday evening) at the end of the 10:30 A.M. Mass on Sunday. In one of the original forms of this devotion, as practiced in the city of Milan in Italy, the devotion was continuously celebrated, moving from parish to parish. What better way can we show our appreciation and our grateful love than by giving back to Him a small bit of our time. As good stewards, we never forget that He is the One Who gives us all the time that we have in our lives to begin with. Thanks to all who are showing that love for Christ this weekend, and thanks especially to those who do so every week throughout the year in our Perpetual Adoration program. God bless!

Special thanks to Larry Rolfson and the Knights of Columbus for cleaning out the parish storage garage (by the thrift store). Just like attics, basements, and garages of regular families, our "parish family" had accumulated a lot of things that had not been used in a long time and so, late in October, it was cleaned out. This sale was much easier to conduct than the one in the summer, when we were undergoing our sidewalk "facelift" on the east side of the school and church (beautiful result, but somewhat disruptive at the time!). It is a joy to work with so many individuals and organizations in our parish that have such a "can do" and "will do" attitude. That is most certainly why so many great things get done. God bless our good stewards—they are using their talents well for the Kingdom.
