

PASTOR'S NOTES:

We wish you all a very merry "little Christmas," as the Epiphany has been called. It is not so much a completely different celebration than Christmas itself (although today is the traditional time, at least for western Christians, to remember the coming of the Magi). It is the day that gifts are given in many Christian places, and among eastern Christians, it is the original day to celebrate Christ our God coming among us, the Incarnation, just as Christmas is among western Christians. In the early Church, the west adopted the feast of the east and vice-versa, so we now have two celebrations, or, perhaps a better way to describe it, two "poles" of the Christmas season. In addition to the theme of the visit of the Magi (a symbol of the coming of the non-Jews, or Gentiles, to God, to join the Jews), there are two other themes—the changing of the water into wine at the wedding feast of Cana—the first public miracle of Jesus, at least according to the Gospel of John—and the Baptism of Jesus by His cousin, John the Baptist. This last theme is found most prominently among eastern Christians. It was probably a very surprising thing for the early Christians to have to explain and defend—why did Jesus, Who is said to be sinless, submit to baptism by John? He did it, as we will see next weekend, on a feast dedicated to this very theme, in order to announce His mission to the world—with the Father and the Holy Spirit present to witness as well. Jesus was not cleansed by the waters, but made them a source of blessing for us when we are baptized into Him. The Father is saying: "This is My beloved Son. My favor rests on Him." The Spirit of God will descend like a dove and hover over Him. In all three of these Epiphany themes, the message is clear—God is showing Himself to His people. He is letting us know that He is here, in our lives, and He is planning to stay. That is more than reason enough to celebrate!

I want to take this opportunity, on behalf of myself and the other two priests, to thank all of you for your many kind cards, notes, and gifts to us during the last few weeks. It is always humbling to me personally to witness the generosity of so many of God's holy people, and it is a sign that they are capable of generosity in so many ways throughout the year to extend the message of God's Presence among us to all the world. We receive our faith, not to "keep" as a family heirloom of some kind, but to share it with others—with all. In some Christian communities, this is a day to remember the missions—the places where we extend our love as God's family—just as we recall the "mission" of Jesus, being sent by the Father to our cold world. He brings light and warmth to all. Thank you and God bless all of you! You yourselves are the greatest gift to us that we could ask for.

Speaking of thanks, I would like to thank the Knights of Columbus for helping to sponsor a dinner for many of our good parish volunteers—not all of them at once, for we can only have room for so many at a time—maybe you will be asked next year, if you were not asked this year or last. All of you are second to none!

Congratulations to Dustin and Erin Vannurden Smith, and to Tim and Christine Dietl Faircloth, both couples married in Christ during the last month. We were also happy at that time to welcome Tim into the fullness of the Catholic faith and confirm him and give him his First Holy Communion. May God bless you and yours always!
