PASTOR'S NOTES:

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord marks the final day of the Christmas season, at least in the liturgy. There will be some of the themes of this season reflected in the Sundays to come—we used to call them Sundays after Epiphany, although now they are simply Sundays in Ordinary Time. They bridge the gap between Jesus coming among us and doing what He came to do-the themes found in Lent, Holy Week, Easter, Ascension, and Pentecost. The event of the Lord's Baptism was used as ammunition against Christians by some of those who did not become followers of Jesus-Why would Jesus, supposedly the greater, be baptized by John the Baptist, the lesser of the two? And why would Jesus "need" to be baptized in the first place? Christians related the story that we hear in the Gospel today—this was the dramatic event that revealed the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit to the world. The waters did not cleanse Jesus, but rather, His presence in the waters made them a source of blessing to all of us. The Sacrament of Baptism shows the power of God's work in our lives, as we are transformed into a new creation. John the Baptist was only preparing the way for the Lord—his baptism was only a symbolic baptism of repentance which did not take away any sin. Jesus, the Lamb of God, would now begin His public work and "take away the sins of the world." This was a great event that demonstrated to the world Who He was and what He came to do-the One Who came to free us from our sins!

Thanks to the Knights of Columbus for helping us celebrate Epiphany last weekend and to thank many of the great people in our parish who help with so many things. We were not able to thank everyone, but we did thank quite a few. God bless all of our good stewards!

Winter is a time for introspection, since many prefer to stay indoors (although there are many who relish the winter for sledding or ice skating or some other activity). This coming Friday we celebrate the memorial of St. Anthony—not the one who helps us find things, for he came only in the Middle Ages—but the original saint of that name, who came from a well-to-do family in Egypt. As a young man, he inherited his parents' fortune, but

chose to give it away (save for something to take care of sister-although he later made other arrangements for her) after hearing the Gospel about Jesus challenging the rich young man to sell what he had, to give to the poor, and to follow Him. Unlike the man in the Gospel, Anthony took the message to heart. Going out into the desert, he became one of the first to profess the monastic life, living to be 105 years old. St. Athanasius, the great patriarch of Alexandria who courageously fought the Arian heresy (which denied that Jesus was truly God), wrote Anthony's biography, which became a very influential book that helped to spread the idea of monasticism. In addition to fighting false teachings and encouraging fellow Christians during the Roman persecutions which still raged, Anthony taught the value of prayer. Not everyone is called to do it in such a radical way, but all are called to do it in some way. Anthony inspired many young men and women to follow the Lord in a radical way, but he inspired even more to do it in the daily struggle of life that the average person faces—struggling with temptation and the other things that keep our souls from being lifted up to God in prayer. We ask Anthony to pray for us here in 2020. Another great figure of the early centuries, St. Hilary (also a fighter against the false Arian teaching) is commemorated on Monday. He helped and inspired St. Martin of Tours in the country we now call France. Like all the saints, no matter what their state in life (and Hilary was a bishop), he teaches us what the Second Vatican Council reminded us of as well-there is a universal call to holiness. It is not limited to "professional pray-ers" or any one group of people; rather, it is a call to each and every person, beginning with the followers of Jesus Christ. In other words, we are all called to be saints—that is the only definition of true success in our lives—if we allow God to make us the people we were meant to be, people whose holiness is based on their individual personalities and calls from God. St. Hilary and St. Anthony-help us to become saints!
