PASTOR'S NOTES:

We have been receiving some information from the diocese concerning returning to Mass. Fr. Kubat (also an M.D. and the chairman of a committee of health professionals and others advising our parishes and institutions) writes: "Public health authorities define a significant exposure to Covid-19 as face-to-face contact within 6 feet with a patient with symptomatic Covid-19 that is sustained for at least a few minutes (and some say more than 10 minutes or even 30 minutes). The chance of catching Covid-19 from a passing interaction in a public space is therefore minimal. Notice the sustained face-to-face contact mentioned above is with someone who is symptomatic." This means that the chances of contracting this virus while receiving (or distributing) Holy Communion is minimal. "All of this said, none of this means we cast aside the safety measures instituted in our parishes, including spacing individuals and family units six feet apart since they are together 30 to 60 minutes. Let us remind ourselves we have created in our churches the safest environment possible for the public and for ourselves." Giving you this excerpt from Fr. Kubat's letter to us is not meant to discourage caution, but only to reassure you if you have concerns. Given our limited capacity (with every other pew being closed, so as to help people keep six-foot distances), we are certainly not back to "normal," but those who attend Mass now should feel some comfort. By keeping your physical (but not necessarily your social!) distance, you are doing well. Face masks in public have been highly encouraged. Little by little, step by step, Nebraskans can do it right. God bless!

This coming Saturday is our nation's Independence Day, our 244th birthday as a republic. Fireworks are wonderful on that day, but let us never

forget the sacrifices of the men and women that went before us to ensure our continued independence and freedom. God bless our land!

Monday evening we will be celebrating the graduation of our 2020 eighth-grade class. Congratulations to our young men and women who are taking the step to various high schools and leaving their former classmates behind. Thanks to some modifications, we were able to keep many of our school traditions alive this year—even if we are a month or so behind. Forward to the future!

I have noticed my own mood going up and down based on the COVID-19 news and the protests after the George Floyd death in Minneapolis. For the most part, though, the future looks bright. We can say this, not only from the lessons we learn from the past, but also because Christianity is, by its very nature, a religion of optimism. That was the lesson we learned at Christmas last December (and every time we celebrate Christmas every year), and even more so at Easter this April. Jesus was put to death, but rose from the dead—that is the unshakably positive message that is the very heart of our faith. Sin and death have been definitively defeated, and although the battles are still being fought in each of us, those forces do not win. We have a sneak peek at the end of the story of all existence, and it is good. As we say on the last Sunday of the Church's liturgical year on the Solemnity of Christ the King at the end of November, Christus vincit! regnat! Christus imperat! Christ conquers! Christ reigns! Christ commands! Peace be to you as we mark the end of the first half of 2020 and the beginning of the second and, we hope, better half. God is good!
