### **PASTOR'S NOTES**

Please pray for the Pope's Intention for the month of December: For a life of prayer. That our personal relationship with Jesus Christ be nourished by the Word of God and a life of prayer. The themes that are found in the readings of the last few Sundays (including last week's Christ the King celebration) continue as we begin the new Church year cycle with the First Sunday of Advent this weekend. What a powerful message for us during this most extraordinary year—Christ is coming and the future is bright! We in New Testament times are also living in expectation and hope, just as those in Old Testament times were. The Son of God took flesh and became Man (at the Annunciation, and made manifest by His birth in Bethlehem at Christmas) to fulfill the Old Testament hope, but even though He has come in history, we await His coming in majesty at the end of time (the "Second Coming"), when He will come to judge the living and the dead, and we celebrate His coming in mystery in the sacraments today. Christ has died, Christ is risen, and, most certainly (we say with great hope and longing), Christ will come again. Any of the disappointments, discouragements, inconveniences, and just plain old downright trials that we have faced during the last few months are passing, but eternity looms before us, and it makes our present situation seem minor by comparison. Many religions and cultures in the world stress the idea of "circular" time—we come back to where we were before. What our Judeo-Christian heritage vividly teaches us and reminds us is that we are making progress toward a definite goal. As some very good cooks used to say at meals-don't get rid of your dessert forks, for the best is yet to come. Hope is the "theological virtue" (a gift from God) that enables us to trust that what God has promised, He will deliver. May it be so soon!

Next weekend will be our traditional Forty Hours devotion. There is not much different in terms of logistics for those involved in adoration hours. Those who do not have hours at all or those who have them during the week are invited to stop in during the weekend to pay respects to our

Eucharistic Lord. Yours truly will give an introduction at 5:30 on Friday evening for those who wish to attend and celebrate the Church's official Evening Prayer (which takes about ten minutes), and I will be preaching at all of the Masses for the Second Sunday of Advent (including Saturday night). We will have a small procession on Sunday at the end of 10:30 Mass, much like the one on Holy Thursday evening. The Forty Hours devotion used to be an annual event in parishes in many dioceses, and is a chance to remember the gift of the Lord to us in His Passion and Death and Resurrection (lasting approximately forty hours of the weekend, as on Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday). For many, this year's Advent and Christmas celebrations will be far from "normal," but there is great potential for each of us to recapture some of the spiritual aspects of this time that often get overwhelmed by the so-called "holidays." Disruption of beloved annual traditions seems to be the name of the game this year, but greeting the Lord Who is coming may be one that we can and should keep. His coming makes all the difference in the world!

It has been said that many people who identify as Catholics do not believe that Jesus Christ has a Real Presence among us in the Holy Eucharist. If this is true, it is very sad. Perhaps we can be charitable and say that it is a misunderstanding of terms or that there is some unseemly flaw or bias in the polling process that brings us this information. The fact remains that if someone really did not believe that Jesus Christ could be present for us, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, then he or she really does not understand why we celebrate Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. In Advent, we look forward to the coming of Jesus, but when we get to Christmas and Epiphany, we are celebrating the fact that He is already here, even now. May the Heart of Jesus, in the Most Blessed Sacrament, be praised, adored, and loved with grateful affection, at every moment, in all the Tabernacles of the world, even to the end of time. Amen.
