PASTOR'S NOTES

Today is the Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time. Oddly enough, the last Sunday in this "Ordinary Time" designated as such was the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time on February 14 (before Ash Wednesday). We have been using the daily readings from this season since Pentecost Sunday (from the week of the Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time). It seems rather confusing, but since the reform of the Church year calendar, the time once called the Sundays after Epiphany and the Sundays after Pentecost have been combined into "Ordinary Time." It is not ordinary in the sense of being plain or common, but in the sense of being in the time of the Holy Spirit, the time of grace, which was preceded by and made possible by the coming of the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity in our midst (Advent-Christmas-Epiphany), Who came to share our lot and free us from the burdens of sin and death. and Who was followed by the coming of the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity (Lent-Easter-Pentecost). It is a time to reflect on our "ordinary" spiritual life and growth. "Besides the times of the year that have their own distinctive character, there remains in the yearly cycle thirty-three or thirty-four weeks in which no particular aspect of the mystery of Christ is celebrated, but rather the mystery of Christ itself is honored in its fullness, especially on Sundays. This period is known as Ordinary Time" (Universal Norms, 43). As in all times of the Church year, Sunday is the key: "The Lord's Day is the original feast day, and it should be proposed to the faithful and taught to them so that it may become in fact a day of joy and of freedom from work. Other celebrations, unless they be truly of the greatest importance, shall not have precedence over Sunday, which is the foundation and kernel of the whole liturgical year" (from #106 of The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (Sacrosanctum Concilium), December 1963). The rhythms of the liturgical year also help us to understand and find meaning in the rhythms of our own individual lives. There is nothing "ordinary" about that!
