#### Nebraska Walk for Life - Saturday, Jan. 29 Nebraska Walk for Life is an annual event. It's the largest, longest-running Senior Priest in Residence: Rev. Valerian Bartek First Amendment demonstration against abortion in the state. It started in January 1974 and has been held on a Saturday in January ever since. Attendees have any or all of these choices: 9am Mass at St. Mary's (1420 K St, Lincoln); 10am - gather on the north side of the State Capitol (15th SIB & K streets) in Lincoln for a brief program; and then we proceed to the Nebraska UNL Student Union (14th & R streets), where you may stay if you wish, to hear the keynote speaker, with Guest Speaker Ashley 959 Bratcher, Award-winning actress of "Unplanned" and "Princess Cut".

Ashley starred in "Unplanned" despite being told that Hollywood would blacklist her for doing an openly pro-life role. Later, when Hollywood stars threatened to boycott her home state of Georgia because of a new prolife law, Ashley fought back, even calling boycott leader Alyssa Milano personally. In addition, Ashley, whose own mother visited an abortion clinic before changing her mind and carrying her to term, has partnered with Heartbeat International for a scholarship program so women with unplanned pregnancies can continue their education. Come support the pro-life cause and listen to this brave woman's heart-lifting story!

## PASTOR'S NOTES

In 2019, Pope Francis designated this Third Sunday in Ordinary Time as a time to be devoted to the celebration, study, and dissemination of the word of God. This Sunday of the Word of God is a time when we are encouraged to strengthen our bonds with the Jewish people (through whom the word of God first came) and to pray for Christian unity. It is not just one day devoted to the Bible as an annual event, but a reminder that we need to continue to grow in our knowledge and love of the Scriptures and of the risen Lord, Who continues to speak His word and to break bread in the community of believers (cf. his motu proprio of Sept. 30, 2019, Aperuit illis). Cardinal Newman of England, recently proclaimed a saint, once wrote: "The love of God alone can give such knowledge its right direction. There is the danger lest men so informed find themselves scrutinizing when they should be adoring, reasoning when they should be believing, comparing when they should be choosing, and proving when they should be acting" (Parochial and Plain Sermons VIII). We hope that all of us have a deep love for God's holy word, and that we continue to learn to put it into practice. We all need the practice.

Thanks to the Knights for having a monthly rosary in the church before their meeting (all are welcome to the time of prayer), and their One Rose, One Life initiative to help foster prolife programs in our community and state that work to benefit people rather than the abortion industry. The abortion industry is very powerful and influential in our country, as seen in the recent FDA approval of the "abortion pill." Next year will be the fiftieth anniversary of Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton. God willing, those infamous decisions may be overturned this year. The downfall of these decisions will not be the end of legal abortion, but it will help end federal promotion of legal abortion. How patronizing and degrading to say that women need access to abortion in order to be equal in dignity to men. There is a real social problem-both sides can concede this—but how best to find a solution? Instead of the government (whether federal or state) trying to promote "access to abortion," would it not be better to try to promote the welfare of mother and child? Some seem to advocate abortion as a quick and easy way to avoid dealing with the last question. This weekend saw the national March for Life in Washington, D.C., and this coming Saturday is the occasion of the Nebraska march in Lincoln. May God bless all the people that have worked on human(e) solutions to the problem. Let us pray and work for the day when abortion becomes

unthinkable. Then it will also be, of course, illegal, but making it unthinkable is our real target. We have the job of changing the hearts and minds of a lot of people around us.

This past Monday we remembered Dr. Martin Luther King. How far our nation has come since he was touching the conscience of our nation is still discussed by many, but "civil rights" has come to mean a lot of things that Dr. King would have been surprised, if not shocked, to find out. May all of the people of our nation still strive to uphold and advance the bold promises made in our Declaration of Independence, our Constitution, and the Bill of Rights in every aspect of our lives in the way that all can recognize and respect.

I mentioned previously about the Mass of the Catechumens and the Mass of the Faithful, now called the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Those who were not yet fully initiated into the community by baptism were not allowed to stay for the second part of the Mass. Of course, today, anyone can find Mass televised or through other media, so there are no "secrets" to keep from those who are not in the Church. At funerals and weddings especially, it is common to find many (or even most!) people who are not Catholics, and many who are not even Christians. We here are livestreaming the 8 A.M. Mass every Sunday (thanks to Dan Rubin and many other people who helped make it possible). The Mass is meant to be primarily for the community of believers, but we are happy to welcome those who want to learn more about us and worship the living God with us, eventually in full communion with us as well. God bless all our evangelizers!
