


Christmas Choir rehearsal Please share your talent in the

<u>This Advent</u>, Bishop Conley is recommending to all diocesan parishes to take up a collection for "<u>Hope of the Poor</u>", a small group who work in the Omaha, Nebraska and Mexico City, Mexico areas. Because my husband and I were very recently on a Pilgrimage to Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City, in conjunction with a Mission Trip with "Hope of the Poor", Fr. Timmerman asked me to give you a little idea of what we saw with Hope of the Poor. *-Sue Stevens*

Hope of the Poor reaches out and serves some of the most forgotten, neglected, and abandoned people in Mexico City. I very much didn't know what to expect on a mission trip – I admit that I was going more to see the Tilma of Our Lady of Guadalupe, and to pray as often as I could there, in the Basilica and on Tepeyac Hill! But I found experiencing the two together (Pilgrimage and Mission Trip) was a great blend. It is still playing in my mind. Something will suddenly remind me of a scene with a person or persons that I met on the mission trip. I guess that attests to how it moved me, unexpectedly and deeply.

I was very impressed with the methods and caring of the small team of Hope of the Poor. They can do little to help the government change, but they can help individuals. To them, the people they were helping were not a faceless group of people all in the same tragic boat. The team saw, and showed us, their individuality. This group not only gives food and blankets to the poor, but they also give them help to improve their particular situation. They help them to: guit and stay off drugs, to get away from prostitution, to be able to send their children to school, to find employment. When funds come available to Hope of the Poor, an apartment can be rented to give them a home in a safe place. A previously-helped "Mom" type of person oversees their progression. And the individuals themselves work toward all of that while learning about God through seeing Him in the actions of the team, and through RCIA classes, if they wish to attend! God is a very good partner when you are looking for hope! Many come to desire baptism and the sacraments. Hope of the Poor works under Cardinal Carlos Aguiar Retes and is an official apostolate of the Archdiocese of Mexico.

Throughout Advent, there will be special boxes at the inside the Sanctuary, south wall by the windows, if you'd like to financially aid their efforts. Prayers are also needed!

Keep Christ in Christmas – The Knights will be selling Christmas Cards in the Commons after Masses until they are all gone. Proceeds from the sales go to support our many charities, and the religiously-themed cards help us all keep Christ in Christmas! **Boys becoming Men** – We know boys are eager to learn more about becoming men as they mature. The Knights of Columbus can be a valuable part of that learning and maturing process. The Thursday December 14th *Into the Breach* presentation and discussion are age-appropriate for boys who are teenagers or who have been confirmed. Boys and parents, please join us from 6:30 to 7:30pm in the Sanctuary and St. Joseph's Room. (On the second Thursday of each month we both pray the Rosary AND learn more about becoming a stronger Catholic man.)

Next Parish Rosary – Thursday, Dec 14, at 6:30pm in the Sanctuary. We will pray for our local intentions and for the Pope's monthly intention: for persons with disabilities.
