Dear Parishioners,

Ash Wednesday is upon us. As you know, it lands on Valentine's Day this year, and no, I will not be giving out ashes in the shape of a Valentine's heart! Maybe for ten bucks... ©

You still have some time during this Pre-Lenten season to pray about what you would like to do (or not do) during the holy 40 days of Lent. At RCIA this past week, we talked about why the Church focuses on fasting, prayer and almsgiving during these 40 days. It truly is a sacred time for us to convert our hearts away from sin and towards virtue, walk with Jesus on the road to Calvary by denying ourselves, and bolster our prayer life by adding something that is very feasible for us to do.

On the back side of this letter are **40 unique ideas for Lent**, that RCIA Coordinator Misty Mealy shared with the class. Some of us may struggle with deciding what to do this year for Lent, or maybe we feel like we are in a rut because our mind is blank and we are tired of doing the same things we have done in years past. This year would be a good year to be very intentional about what and how we want this Lent to be. Now is the time to make this Lent the beginning of change in ourselves that we want to have, not just for the next 40 days, but for the rest of our lives.

2024 Diocesan Lenten Regulations:

<u>Ash Wednesday and Good Friday</u> are days of fast and abstinence. <u>All Fridays in Lent</u> are days of abstinence.

<u>Fasting</u> means eating only one full meal with two smaller meals, which together do not equal the full meal. No snacks or eating between meals. Fasting obliges Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59.

<u>Abstinence</u> means eating no meat nor soup nor gravy made from meat. Abstinence obliges all Catholics over the age of 14. Sickness, hard manual labor, pregnancy, etc., automatically excuse a person from these obligations. Nevertheless, it should be pointed out that these are **serious** obligations. In cases of doubt or question, the priest who hears a person's confession should be consulted.

40 Unique Ideas for Lent

- 1. Pray and fast for one particular person every day of Lent.
- 2. If you struggle with identity/self-worth, write down something nice about yourself daily.
- 3. Only buy things you absolutely need.
- 4. Pray the rosary daily for someone who has harmed you.
- 5. Work out every day, even if you don't feel like it.
- 6. Intentionally give sincere compliments to everyone you have a conversation with.
- 7. Prepare all your own food instead of eating out.
- 8. Only use screens for work/school, not recreation.
- 9. Turn off all noise and distractions for extended periods of time (hours at a time).
- 10. Write a letter to different people every day of Lent telling them what they mean to you.
- 11. Call someone you don't talk to regularly every day.
- 12. Daily Mass two or three more times per week.
- 13. 1 hour of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament twice a week.
- 14. Pray morning, evening, and night prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours.
- 15. Volunteer weekly at a shelter, soup kitchen, retirement community, etc.
- 16. Host a donation drive for a local charity.
- 17. Coordinate a day of service for a local charity
- 18. Go on a retreat.
- 19. Let God choose your cross and ask him to help you suffer with acceptance and dignity.
- 20. Go to Confession weekly.
- 21. Drink just water; donate what you would have spent on beverages to a clean water charity.
- 22. Start a new monthly donation to a great cause you have never donated to before.
- 23. Offer daily prayers for your pastor and/or bishop.
- 24. Give up speeding for all of Lent.
- 25. Fast from your favorite food every day.
- 26. Spend an hour a day reading Catholic books.
- 27. Invite someone who has few friends to lunch or coffee. Do this every week.
- 28. Surprise someone with a gift of flowers, a meal, basket of goodies, etc.
- 29. Make bags of food, water, socks, and donate them to those experiencing homelessness.
- 30. Get 8 hours of sleep every night instead of staying up with the TV, phone etc.
- 31. Spend your commute in silence and/or prayer.
- 32. Play a short daily game with your family members.
- 33. Every time you go to Mass, find someone you don't know and introduce yourself.
- 34. Increase your charitable giving or start tithing.
- 35. Cut salt from all your food.
- 36. Pray in front of an abortion clinic for an hour a week.
- 37. Resolve to ask more questions of others than they do of you.
- 38. Choose something to donate daily.
- 39. Refrain from saying anything negative about anyone, no matter how tempted.
- 40. Have your family/friends come up with 3 suggestions and choose from the list.

The History of Ash Wednesday

Ashes have a place of prominence throughout the Old Testament. They are an outward sign of an internal state of penance or mourning. You can find some scriptural references below:

"Therefore I disown what I have said, and repent in dust and ashes." - Job 42: 6

"Daughter of my people, dress in sackcloth, roll in the ashes." - Jeremiah 6:26

"I turned to the Lord God to seek help, in prayer and petition, with fasting, sackcloth, and ashes." - Daniel 9:3

"When the news reached the king of Nineveh, he rose from his throne, laid aside his robe, covered himself with sackcloth, and sat in ashes. Then he had this proclaimed throughout Nineveh: "By decree of the king and his nobles, no man or beast, no cattle or sheep, shall taste anything; they shall not eat, nor shall they drink water. Man and beast alike must be covered with sackcloth and call loudly to God; they all must turn from their evil way and from the violence of their hands." - Jonah 3: 6-8

And the practice continued after the coming of Jesus. The practice of public penance was common in the Early Church. After making a confession a person would receive ashes on his head from the priest. The practice of using ashes to mark the beginning of Lent is first recorded during the time of St. Gregory the Great. The Gregorian Sacramentary has the earliest known record of it, then called the "Day of Ashes." Pope Urban II recommended the practice be used universally throughout the Church in 1091.

Why Ashes?

For centuries, Catholic Christians have marked the beginning of the season of Lent by receiving ash on their foreheads on Ash Wednesday. This tradition has its roots in the Old Testament, where wearing ashes was a common sign of repentance for sins, and a sign of one's humility before God. Since Lent is a season of penitential renewal through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, it's appropriate that this ancient sign marks the beginning of the season.

The ashes themselves are usually made by burning the palm fronds from the previous year's Palm Sunday. This symbolically connects the beginning of Lent with its end, connecting our change of heart with Christ's passion, death, and resurrection.

Ashes are usually distributed as part of the Mass on Ash Wednesday, often after the homily. As people approach the priest or other minister, he presses the ashes to their foreheads, and speaks one of two phrases: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return," or "Repent and believe in the Gospel."

Ash Wednesday's Significance

So when we go to Mass on Ash Wednesday and receive the blessed ashes on our forehead, we are repeating a somber, pious act that Catholics have been undergoing for over 1,500 years. As "The Liturgical Year, Septuagesima," by Abbot Gueranger, O.S.B., written in the middle decades of the 1800s, puts it: "We are entering, today, upon a long campaign of the warfare spoke of by the apostles: forty days of battle, forty days of penance. We shall not turn cowards, if our souls can but be impressed with the conviction that the battle and the penance must be gone through.

Like all those before us, we unhesitatingly embrace this invitation to sanctity this time to turn away from sin. We are part of that great cloud of witnesses who through all the ages have donned the ashes, publicly acknowledging that we are Christians, Christians who have sinned and seek to repent.

<u>Good Shepherd Scholarship Announcement – 2024-2025 School Year</u>

We are delighted to announce that the Lincoln Diocese will continue offering Good Shepherd Scholarships for the 2024-2025 school year to students attending diocesan Catholic Schools who participate in the program. Since its inception in 2019, the Lincoln Diocese has awarded over \$12.0 million in financial aid to families enrolled in diocesan Catholic Schools. During the current academic year, the Good Shepherd Scholarship Program achieved the following milestones:

- Awarded 1,551 student scholarships, totaling over \$3.1 million dollars
- Provided scholarships to 25% of Catholic School students
- Attained a 100% Graduation Rate for senior scholarship recipients (84% Nebraska Rate, 85% U.S. Rate)
- 27% of the scholarship recipients were from minority backgrounds

The **Good Shepherd Scholarship** will be increased in the 2024-2025 academic year to \$1,800 for grades K-8 and \$2,100 for grades 9-12 and will cover families within 225% of the Federal Poverty Level. The **Family Tuition Cap Scholarship** is offered to families with more than three students enrolled in the Diocese of Lincoln Catholic Schools. Families pay tuition for the first three students and the rest will be tuition-free (K-12).

To be eligible for the Good Shepherd Scholarship or the Family Tuition Cap Scholarship families must complete an application and upload tax document through the **FACTS Scholarship Management** program. Any family may apply, regardless of religious affiliation. For more information or to apply for these scholarships go to **www.goodshepherdscholarship.com**.

Good Shepherd Scholarship Program - 2024 - 2025

- 1. Good Shepherd Scholarships (GSS) are for families who are within 225% of the Federal Poverty Level and have students in grades Kindergarten through 12th grade who attend participating Lincoln Diocese Catholic Schools.
- 2. Family Tuition Cap Scholarships are for families with more than 3 students, families pay for tuition for the first 3 students and the rest receive free tuition.
- 3. Families must apply in FACTS for all scholarships and submit 2022 or 2023 Tax Forms, including the 1040 and W-2
- 4. The FACTS application is one \$40 fee for all scholarships, including GSS and local Catholic school scholarships.
- 5. Families must complete the FACTS Scholarship application each year in FACTS to be eligible for scholarships.
- 6. Scholarship applications start January 1, 2024 and the deadline to complete the application is March 31, 2024.
- 7. The definition of income follows the Federal Lunch Program guidelines (https://www.fns.usda.gov/cn/eligibilitymanual-school-meals)




