<u>After this coming weekend's Masses</u> (May 18 & 19), fellow pro-life Catholics will be collecting signatures for a pro-life ballot initiative (Protect Women and Children) that will provide protections for babies in the second and third trimester in the Nebraska state constitution.

Cemetery decoration placement during <u>Memorial Day weekend:</u> Decoration of graves for Memorial Day can be placed on the Friday before and must be removed no later than 7 days after Memorial Day.

Please also keep in mind that, with the exception of during the above stated Memorial Day time-frame, shepherd hooks, statues, figurines, eternal light, artificial flowers etc., are not allowed from March through November, unless they are permanently and correctly installed in the minimal 4" foundation ribbon of the monument/headstone. No items are allowed in or on the ground. All live flowers, wreaths, etc., must be removed from graves as soon as they are withered or dried.

Know the Important Difference!

There is a ballot initiative being proposed by pro-abortion activists, and a <u>pro-life counter-initiative</u> to defeat it. The pro-life initiative will also help ensure current protections for unborn babies.

Out on the streets, or even at your home's front door, you might be approached to sign one or the other of these initiatives. Please be aware which petition it is by reading the <u>opening words</u> on the petition. **The pro-abortion proposal has the words**, **"All persons shall have a fundamental right to abortion..."**. Note: Then the wording goes on with such vague and deceptive language that it could even be mistaken as pro-life, but in reality, it would once again allow late-pregnancy abortions into the second and third trimester in Nebraska. Fr. Timmerman and the Bishops of Nebraska strongly urge you to NOT sign this petition or support the pro-abortion effort.

The other ballot initiative, the **PRO-LIFE proposal**, has toward the beginning: "...except when a woman seeks an abortion necessitated by a medical emergency....". It then clearly provides protection for unborn children in the second and third trimester. (While this is not perfect protection for the unborn, it will help keep already-existing pro-life laws in Nebraska that protect women, girls, and babies and you can morally support this ballot measure, such as by signing this petition to get specific protection for babies on the ballot.)

So... Fr. Timmerman and the Bishops of Nebraska strongly denounce the dangerous and deceptive pro-abortion initiative, and they support and urge you to sign <u>the pro-life petition</u>. Look at the beginning phrases in order to be sure you know which initiative petition is being presented to you – the person handing you the petition might also use deceptive words! We hope and pray that the pro-life initiative will have enough signatures to get on the November ballot. Both sides have until July 3rd to get enough signatures for their proposal. There will be more information in the bulletin after the deadline in July.

Dear Parishioners,

Thank you to those who attended our Open Forums on May 5th and 6th. Fr. Hottovy from the Diocesan Committee for Church Design and Renovation gave an insightful presentation on the general principles of Catholic church architecture. We invited Father to talk to us and provide information that can assist us in our Strategic Planning efforts. If you were not able to attend, some of the highlights were:

• There is an organic development in the architectural design of Catholic churches over time. There are differences in what a Catholic church can look like, but it should not be a complete abandonment from what is traditionally Catholic.

• There is a solid tradition of authentic Catholic architecture over the 2,000-year history of the Catholic Church.

• Beauty – elevating the heart and mind to God through the human senses – should be central in a Catholic church building.

• One source of documentation for the design principles of Catholic churches is from the Second Vatican Council's "Sacrosanctum Concilium" – the Council's document on the Sacred Liturgy.

• The sacred space of a Catholic church should be "a foretaste of heaven". That is, it's beauty, design and theological thrust (divine-like quality) should give us an experience of heaven in the here and now of this particular church.

• The interior of the church should also include reference(s) to its patron. For example, in a church dedicated to St. John the Baptist, there could be a statue of him, a stained-glass window with his depiction, or a painting. That way a stranger walking in would know immediately that the church was dedicated to this saint.

• When a Catholic church is being designed and built, special care should be applied to make it known that this is absolutely not a personal home or civic space, where functionality, efficiency and utility are high on the list. They are not bad things, but top priorities for a Catholic church are objective beauty, timelessness (i.e., 200 years from now, it will still be easily recognized as a Catholic church), and theological forcefulness.

• A Catholic church building is the place where we celebrate the vast majority of the sacraments of our Catholic faith. Baptism, Reconciliation, Holy Mass with the Holy Eucharist, Confirmation, Matrimony, Sacred Orders. These are holy and special encounters with God, and our church environment should also reflect that sacred nature. It helps us to pray during these times. Elevation of our heart and mind to heaven.

Our Strategic Planning Team is continuing to meet regularly and fine-tune the 3 pillars of our Mission: "Catholic: Evangelization, Education and Worship." We really appreciate not only your presence at the Open Forums, but also the input you have provided, either online or in the suggestion box in the Commons.
